
Untangling 'the alphabet soup' in social surveys

(and why it matters)




Experiences from two national studies





The National LGBTO+ Women*s **Community Survey is a comprehensive** national study distributed online, in **English and Spanish, that addresses** the significant gap in knowledge, policy analysis, organizing, and advocacy about the life experiences, needs, priorities and challenges faced by LGBTQ+ women, our partners, and families.



Step One: Distinguish between

- Biological **Sex**
- **Gender** (identity and expression)
- Sexuality (attraction, behavior and identity)



Step Two: Break the Binary

Biological Sex (only legal identity)

What is your sex?

Male. Female

What sex were you assigned at birth?

Male. Female. Other

We are collecting this data to compare health outcomes based on biological sex. What sex is recorded on your birth certificate:

Male. Female. Intersex.

Sexuality

- Attraction (who we are drawn to)
- Behavior (who we have sex with)
- **Identity** (community and culture)
- Spectrum of attraction and behavior: same gender, opposite gender, both genders, gender-blind, no-one, oneself
- Structure of Relationships: monogamous, non-monogamous; single, couples, throuple, polyamorous
- **Identity:** straight, gay/lesbian, bi-, poly, queer

Some final thoughts

- Think very carefully about WHY you are asking identity questions and HOW you will use them
- Explore how best to challenge pre-existing frames of sex, gender, and sexuality
- Developing a post-colonial frame through language and culture
- Progressive Prudes open ended question about how same sex relationships and gender non-conformity captured very rich data
- Women's Survey 'other' and 'any additional comments' similarly provided incredible insights
